American Indian Scholar Profile

Benny Jones, a citizen of the Choctaw Nation from Oklahoma, graduated from Northeastern State University this past May with a Bachelor of Science in Cell & Molecular Biology.

Jones, who grew up in Talihina, said he decided to attend NSU because he heard the science program was good and while it was challenging he enjoyed his studies and being on campus as well. He is also the first person in his family to graduate with a bachelor's degree.

"I would say my mom was a major mentor in my life," Jones said. "She always pushed me to try my best in anything I do especially education."

Jones said one piece of advice from his mother he cherishes is "don't worry, God has everything under control." He added he tends to worry a lot if he is uncertain about things. Jones said his mother's advice comforts him during those times he starts to worry.

Along with his mother, other mentors include his preacher back home, Brian Barlow, Alisa Douglas, Shelly Dreadfulwater and Sara Barnett to name a few. Jones said each of those individuals had an influence on him as he embarked on his education journey.

As a student he served as the vice president and treasurer of Sigma Nu Alpha Gamma and the treasurer for the American Indian Science and Engineering Society. It was through his involvement in these student organizations that he learned about the Native American Support Center (NASC). Jones said he was in the library studying one day when he was approached by Barlow about applying to be a science tutor.

He said his experience as part of NASC was great and the staff was so friendly, helpful and really cared for the students. He added he was also introduced to many people through NASC and made several friends.

Outside of student activities, Jones said he likes to spend his time in the weight room or reading a book. He also added that when he reflects on his time at NSU, studying at the library comes to mind as he was always doing homework. He said for him the library was a quiet and friendly environment.

Jones said if he had to give advice to a future RiverHawk it would be to study hard and always make time for oneself. He added while studying is important, so are breaks.

Jones said he is currently taking a gap year after graduating this past May to apply to physical therapy programs.

"It took me awhile to realize that physical therapy was the field that inspired me to pursue a health career in the first place," Jones said. "As I attended college my path changed from here and there to other health careers, but in the end, I realized I would be happiest in this career over the others."

Tara Comingdeer Fields is a citizen of Cherokee Nation. She comes from the Wild Potato Clan and is a member of the Echota Ceremonial Ground in Park Hill, Oklahoma.

Comingdeer Fields received her undergraduate degree in biology from the University of Arkansas in the spring of 2016. She knew that she wanted to work in the healthcare field and hoped that biology would give her a good starting foundation.

Ever since she was a child, Comingdeer Fields can remember wanting to be an eye doctor. Her mother also shared the hope of becoming an eye doctor which inspired Comingdeer Fields to continue her education to pursue that goal.

"I grew up in a traditional Cherokee family, one where we always understood the value of taking care of one another. It is ingrained in me from my family that we always take care of our people," Comingdeer Fields said.

She decided to take the next step of her studies at the Northeastern State University Oklahoma College of Optometry.

NSUOCO's partnership with the Cherokee Nation is part of what brought Comingdeer Fields to study here.

"NSUOCO has opportunities that not a lot of other optometry schools do. NSUOCO partners with Cherokee Nation and its rural clinics to allow student clinicians to see Native patients," Comingdeer Fields said.

Comingdeer Fields was particularly interested in learning to manage diabetic eye diseases and other eye conditions that are prevalent in Tribal communities.

Working with Native patients and making them feel comfortable in a clinic was a highlight of her time at NSUOCO.

"I loved to be in the Cherokee Nation clinics because I was able to help my own community," Comingdeer Fields said. "Taking care of Native patients is my overall passion. I am only where I am in life because of that." Comingdeer Fields recognized the importance of representing Native citizens as she was training to become a doctor.

"I am there to relate to their life experiences, I am there to cheer them on in taking care of themselves for them or their family. I am there to help take care of their overall health: spiritual, mental and physical. It is always a good feeling when patients realize that there is a Native doctor taking care of them," Comingdeer Fields said.

Comingdeer Fields graduated from NSUOCO in May 2021 with her Doctorate of Optometry.

Now, she is living both her and her mother's childhood dream of working as an optometrist at the Clinton Indian Health Center within the Indian Health Service.

While Comingdeer Fields has accomplished many things throughout her career and education, she recognizes the struggles that come with receiving a higher education.

She encourages Native students to work hard and never give up because they are the ones who will be able to make the most impact in Tribal communities.

"As Native students, we walk a fine line between our world and the western institutional setting," Comingdeer Fields said. "At first they may be hard to balance. You can conquer both!"

Comingdeer Fields hopes to continue her career in Tribal health to provide optometric services to Native patients.



THE UNIVERSITY

Northeastern State University is a comprehensive regional university that prepares students to succeed as global citizens by providing exceptional undergraduate and graduate programs, along with the only Doctorate of Optometry offered in Oklahoma (one of only 23 nationwide) and the only Bachelor of Arts degree in Cherokee Education in the nation.

HISTORY

Northeastern was founded in 1846 as the Cherokee National Female Seminary, which opened in 1851. On March 6, 1909, the Oklahoma Legislature purchased the Seminary from the Cherokee Nation, and the following September classes began at the newly formed Northeastern State Normal School. In 2009, the NSU Centennial Celebration highlighted the university's 100 years as a state institution and dedicated a monument to the preeminent Cherokee scholar, Sequoyah.

CENTER FOR TRIBAL STUDIES

The Center for Tribal Studies, founded in 1990, is a resource for bridging communication and interaction between Tribal nations and the university. Within the context of American Indian higher education, the Center collaborates with other campus entities in program development, strategic planning, research guidance, student engagement and scholarly activities. Northeastern State University is a destination of choice for American Indian education, and the diverse campus culture nurtures a strong sense of community for Native students. Through educational leadership, cultural knowledge and professional development among students, scholars emerge - many of whom will serve in professions benefiting Tribal governments and Indigenous communities.

CHEROKEE LANGUAGE DEGREE PROGRAMS

Unique to Northeastern State University, the Bachelor of Arts in Cherokee Language Education is the only American Indian language education degree available in the United States with a curriculum leading to state certification for teachers. Since 2005, the program has brought together university, global and local interests as part of a plan to strengthen the Cherokee language for future generations. In 2009, a bachelor's degree in Cherokee Cultural Studies was added as an option to study language along with other aspects of cultural studies for non-teachers. A Cherokee Studies minor is also available. With alumni now employed at universities and at the Cherokee Language Immersion School, NSU graduates play a vital role in language revitalization.

SYMPOSIUM ON THE AMERICAN INDIAN

The 49th Annual Symposium on the American Indian is scheduled to take place April 4-9, 2022, focused on the theme, *Fulfilling Our Ancestors' Dreams*. In the scholar community, we celebrate the educational accomplishments of our graduates and their publications utilizing Indigenous research methodologies. In our communities, emerging leaders are defending Tribal sovereignty and advocating for policy change to protect our land, water and air. Indigenous authors, lawyers, health care professionals, teachers, philosophers and leaders are using their education for the good of their families and their Tribal communities. These emerging scholars and leaders are indeed standing on the shoulders of our ancestors, not taking for granted the sacrifices made in order for us to carry on our culture and the legacy of resilience. Keynote speakers include Dr. Robin Zape-tah-hol-ah Minthorn, Dr. Corey Still, and Megan Redshirt Shaw.







Top Five Ranking Among Four-Year Colleges Serving American Indians


