The club received T-shirts and lapel pins depicting the flags of Saudi Arabia and the U.S., placed side-by-side, along with Saudi Arabia promotional materials to share with attendees at their events. Events will include Saudi Arabia National Day and Eid Al-Adha, a festival of sacrifice, celebrated with food. It also marks the end of the "Hajj," an annual

pilgrimage to Mecca.

"This is a wonderful opportunity for our students as well as NSU's campus," stated Stephanie Goad, Executive Director of International Programs.

- If you have concurrent enrollment in another institution during Summer, please submit the transcript to the Admissions office to have your credits transferred back to NSU.

Graduating? Traveling? A letter of reminders from your student advisor

Dear international students,

As we approach the end of the Spring Semester, the staff of the OIP wishes you success in your finals and other academic endeavors. We appreciate your attendance at NSU and consider it a privilege to have worked with you.

To ensure you receive updated information from the OIP throughout the break, please check your NSU email periodically.

For Spring 2015 Graduates:

- The OIP had a wonderful International Graduates Recognition Ceremony Thursday May 7, 2015 5:00 PM at the NSU Jazz Lab. Thank you everyone that attended and wished our graduates success.

- Deadline to apply for OPT (Optional Practical Training) is 60 days after the completion date of your program. The OPT application must be received by the USCIS before completion of your degree program. Failure to meet the deadlines will result in the loss of your OPT benefit.

- After completion of studies, F-1 students must be in one of the following situations to continue stay legally in the U.S:

must have already applied for OPT
 admitted to a new program at NSU or other institution

- have a pending case with USCIS for change of status

If none of the above situations, apply students must depart the USA within 60 days. - After completion of studies, you are not allowed to continue to work on campus as a student. Any employment after degree completion without the approval from USCIS is considered unauthorized and will jeopardize your immigration status.

- If planning to travel while on OPT, please contact the OIP for detailed instruction.

- If intending to enter another degree program at NSU, please come to the OIP to request a new I-20 reflecting the new program.

- If transferring to another institution, contact the OIP for SE-VIS transfer process information.

- If you have received a Notice of Action from USCIS regarding a change of your immigration status, please contact the OIP immediately to get your record updated in SEVIS. For Continuing Students:

Travel:

- Fall classes start on August 17, 2015 so please return to NSU before this day.

- If planning to travel during break, please make sure the signature on your I-20 is up to date (less than 1 year old).

- If traveling outside of the U.S, these document are needed in order to

reenter:: a valid passport, an unexpired U.S visa, and I-20 with current signature.

Fall Semester Enrollment:

- You must be enrolled in at least 12 credit hours for undergraduate and

9 hours for graduate students with no more than 3 hours online.

Deadline to enroll and add classes is August 21, 2015.
If concurrently enrolled in another institution



during Summer, please submit the transcript to Admission office to have your credits transferred back to NSU.

Scholarships:

- Check the expiration date on the Letter of Financial Guarantee and make sure to renew it before the semester begins.

Transferring:

- If you are transferring to a different university for the Fall, you must stop by the OIP to complete the transfer procedure.
