American Indian Student Profile - Katie Stewart

Selecting the right college can sometimes be a hard thing to do, unless you are Northeastern State University graduate Katharine Stewart, who said it was a really easy decision to make. Initially, when Stewart decided to attend an institution of higher education, she had applied at both Tulsa Community College and NSU, but that really it was a no-brainer when it came to making a choice.

"I grew up in a small country town, so schools like OU and OSU seemed a bit overwhelming," said Stewart. "NSU seemed like the perfect size. It was really nice. Everyone there is like a big family. I just loved the feel of the campus."

Stewart explained that her sister Sara Barnett had attended Northeastern and loved her experience. Through her sister she had already become acquainted with Dr. Phyllis Fife, Director of the Center for Tribal Studies, who had a huge impact on Stewart's academic experience. NSU was also extremely prompt and helpful with the enrollment process, making enrolling and beginning her academic journey an extremely memorable one.

"Dr. Fife has really just become a major part of the family," explains Stewart. "She is basically like another aunt. For me especially, she was someone I could relate to. When she went back to college she had three daughters, and I have three daughters, as well. She understood my struggles as a student, a mother and a wife. She was someone who could really push me academically and help me to step outside of my comfort zone. She really is amazing."

Stewart became a part of the NSU family and graduated in 2013 as a double major in Organismic-Biology and Criminal Justice. She was an Oklahoma Louis Stokes Alliance for Minority Participation in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (OKLSAMP) scholar, member of Rho Theta Sigma honor society, member of the NSU American Indian Science and Engineering Society (AISES) and her first year and a half on campus Stewart participated in the HIV/AIDS Health Promotion and Education Program, a grant program in partnership with the National Indian Women's Health Resource Center, that provided free HIV testing for American Indian students.

Stepping outside of her comfort zone is exactly what Stewart went on to do. She ended up in Costa Rica twice, once in 2010 and again in 2012.

Stewart was able to travel to this Central American country for research through the Organization for Tropical Studies Native American and Pacific Islanders Research Experience, which was supported by the LSAMP program through the National

Science Foundation. She was also involved in the Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) program, at the University of Arkansas, the summer between her two trips to Costa Rica.

"American Indians are underrepresented in the research fields and this program works to change that," she said. "The educational value of creating a research model and seeing it produce results was worth any hardship. I also had the opportunity to interact with PhDs from all over the world. This was a wonderful experience that I will never forget."

A Muscogee (Creek) citizen, Stewart is thankful for the scholarship support she received from her tribe.

Like any other graduate, Stewart is planning her next move. She is currently applying for jobs and looking into graduate programs.

"I just really enjoyed the Tahlequah campus," said Stewart. "I really hope to continue working with the university as much as I can. I had so much fun working with the students during the OTS NAPIRE summer programs."

With the knowledge of how helpful NSU was, not only with her sister's academic success, but also her professional success, Stewart knew that NSU was the school for her. She was able to make life-long friends, memories and even gain a few more family members.

"I enjoyed being a part of the NSU family," said Stewart.





NORTHEASTERN STATE UNIVERSITY

The University

Northeastern State University is a comprehensive regional university that prepares students to succeed as global citizens by providing exceptional undergraduate and graduate programs, along with the only Doctorate of Optometry offered in Oklahoma (one of only 19 nationwide) and the only Bachelor of Arts degree in Cherokee Education in the nation.

History

Northeastern was founded in 1846 as the Cherokee National Female Seminary, which opened in 1851. On March 6, 1909, the Oklahoma Legislature purchased the Seminary from the Cherokee Nation, and the following September classes began at the newly formed Northeastern State Normal School. In 2009, the NSU Centennial Celebration highlighted the university's 100 years as a state institution and dedicated a monument to the preeminant Cherokee scholar, Sequoyah.

Center for Tribal Studies

The Center for Tribal Studies, founded in 1990, is a resource for bridging communication and interaction between tribal nations and the university. Within the context of American Indian higher education, the Center collaborates with other campus entities in program development, strategic planning, research guidance, student engagement and scholarly activities. Northeastern State University is a destination of choice for American Indian education, and the diverse campus culture nurtures a strong sense of community for Native students. Through educational leadership, cultural knowledge and professional development among students, scholars emerge - many of whom will serve in professions benefiting tribal governments and indigenous communities.

Indigenous Scholar Development Center

The Indigenous Scholar Development Center (ISDC) was established in the fall of 2011. Housed on the second floor of the John Vaughn Library adjacent to Special Collections, the Center offers services to enhance the academic experience of students in a supportive environment. ISDC staff offers guidance, advisement, cultural interaction and leadership development opportunities to increase persistence, retention, graduation and ultimately the professional success of Native American students.

Cherokee Language Degree Programs

Unique to Northeastern State University, the Bachelor of Arts in Cherokee Language Education is the only American Indian language education degree available in the United States with a curriculum leading to state certification for teachers. Since 2005, the program has brought together university, global and local interests as part of a plan to strengthen the Cherokee language for future generations. In 2009, a bachelor's degree in Cherokee Cultural Studies was added as an option to study language along with other aspects of cultural studies for non-teachers. A Cherokee Studies minor is also available. With alumni now employed at universities and at the Cherokee Language Immersion School, NSU graduates play a vital role in language revitalization.

Symposium on the American Indian

The 42nd Annual Symposium on the American Indian is scheduled for April 7-14, 2014 hosted by the American Indian Heritage Committee. The symposium theme is Thriving Nations-Resilient Peoples. Features include lectures, presentations, films, and cultural activities. Speakers are: Dr. Sarah Deer, William Mitchell College of Law Associate Professor; Dr. Colleen Fitzgerald, University of Texas-Arlington linguist; Dr. Donald Fixico, Arizona State University Distinguished Foundation Professor of History; Dr. Stacy Leeds, University of Arkansas School of Law Dean and Professor; John Trudell is an American author, poet, actor, musician, and former political activist.; and others TBA. The NSU Powwow will be April 13 and 14.




